




One-Day Free Trial



Lil' Explorers is written with the child care provider in mind. The ducks section is for the 6 - 18 month olds, turtles section is for 12 - 30 month olds and the dragonflies section is for 2 1/2 - 5 year olds. The activities in this lesson plan should be supervised by a teacher, child care provider or parent.

Each lesson plan will include a list of materials, and a book list on page 3, for the week. On the first page (5) of the lesson plan you will see 3 weekly activities; Literacy Center, Sensory Table and Dramatic Play, these activities should be set up in these centers for the children to explore all week long.

On the pages following you will see 5 different daily lessons, these lessons are to be used each day of the week. A sample schedule is also included on page 4 of this guide.

Lil' Explorers - Unit 1 - Me & My Friends - All Week



In the literacy center for this week place lots of books about babies and children. Anything having to do with the theme Me and My Friends will be a great addition to this center.

In addition to the books, place lots of photos of the children during play, eating, inside and outside photos. It is a good idea to laminate the photos so the children can really explore them.

Make a class book of the children. Place a photo and name on each page of each child in the class. This will become a favorite of the children this week, but you can leave it in your library for use at a later time.

Ask families to make family books at home to donate to your literacy center this week. Ask them to include lots of photos of their family for their child to share with their friends. Incorporating home with school will make the children proud when they can share their family with their friends.

SENSORY TABLE

This week's sensory table should include more photos of family, friends and each child. Again laminate the photos and burry them in shredded paper. Encourage the children to dig for photos of themselves or their family.

Make different scented play dough this week. Use the recipes included with this theme or create your own. Place the play dough on sensory trays and encourage the children to knead, roll, and cut the dough. Encourage them to guess the scents.

Add plastic - unbreakable mirrors to your sensory table. Babies will love looking at themselves in the mirrors. They will giggle, laugh and play peek-a-boo! OH what fun!

Using a flashlight, place a colored piece of tissue paper over the lighted end and shine different colors across the room, on the floor, the walls, even the ceiling, and allow baby to explore, or chase the light.



DRAMATIC PLAY

Set up a home center, complete with play kitchen, dishes and play food. Infants and toddlers will imitate adults in the kitchen. Encourage this play by preparing a meal with them. You will be surprised how quickly they catch on. They enjoy playing side-by-side older children

or adults. Bang pots and pans together, clang the dishes, allow them to make some noise placing them in the sink. Set the table, place the food on the plates. Add as little or as much as your group will enjoy. Aprons, pot holders and table-cloths are a nice addition.

Lavender Flower Play Dough

3 cups flour

2 cups water

3/4 cup sugar

3 Tbsp oil

3 Tbsp. cream of tartar

1/8 cup violet powdered tempera paint

10-20 drops lavender flower essential oil Combine all ingredients in a heavy purple glitter

In large pot, mix together the first five ingredients until smooth. Place the pot away from the sides of the pan. Form over medium heat, stirring constantly until the mixture forms a large ball. While the mixture is still warm, place it on a floured cutting board and knead *This recipe can make any scent of in additional flour until the dough has a play dough by replacing exact with silky texture. 2 cups water

2 cups flour

4 tsp cream of tartar

4 Tbsp. vegetable oil


■ 4 Tbsp. peppermint extract

STORY TIME




All About Me! takes babies on a tour of their own incredible bodies-encouraging imitative play by showing babies making faces and performing simple actions.





hint: provide the children with additional writing paper throughout the week to continue to practice writing the number 1.






